




Social power

The decisive means for politics is violence.






The people are the power: A relationship-centric approach to power






Revolutionary strategy: Building a "counterpower"



When people organize and develop relationships, they build and consolidate a "counterpower," a dense and growing social network which increasingly bends the system until it overcomes it.



Building a "counterpower"




The transformation bends the "rules" of the system — what is possible and what's allowed — just as mass bends space in the universe. The more mass, the more bending.

"Strategically, with regard to the whole, revolutionaries must despise the enemy, dare to struggle against him and dare to seize victory; at the same time, tactically, with regard to each part, each specific struggle, they must take the enemy seriously, be prudent, carefully study and perfect the art of struggle and adopt forms of struggle suited to different times, places and conditions in order to isolate and wipe out the enemy step by step."



Imperialism and all reactionaries have a dual nature -- they are real tigers and paper tigers at the same time. In past history, before they won state power and for some time afterwards, the slave-owning class, the feudal landlord class and the bourgeoisie were vigorous, revolutionary and progressive; they were real tigers.



But with the lapse of time, because their opposites -- the slave class, the peasant class and the proletariat -- grew in strength step by step, struggled against them and became more and more formidable, these ruling classes changed step by step into the reverse, changed into reactionaries, changed into backward people, changed into paper tigers. And eventually they were overthrown, or will be overthrown, by the people.





Walter had not studied the taking of power. I am going to emphasize that because you have to do that. The taking of power has to become the common discussion among the Caribbean people and intellectuals so that all will know it; so that, as young people grow up and develop and begin to look at history, they begin to see not only what has been done to us, but what we have done, what we have achieved, and what we have to do. You begin to talk and to think about the taking of power, because that is what faces you now. I am serious about it. Some of you may think I am too serious about it. Let that be. History will decide.

You cannot depend upon a party to seize the power. Not upon a party, "But upon the advanced class."

What does this mean to you?

What is the role of revolutionary organizations, if not seizing power?

Who is the advanced class - how do they seize power?

Revolutionary risk-taking - when you don't have power, you can face intense retaliation at the hands of those who do.

It is a whole political problem that is involved there, and I would like you to work at it that way.
